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## Important Health Reminders

Generally if students are not feeling well they need to stay at home. This also applies to staff, families, and visitors. ## School Start Time



An important reminder to RHS families that **school begins at 8:30 AM** each day. We recommend that students arrive by 8:15 in the morning to ensure that they have time to prepare for a successful day of learning. Students arriving late miss out on learning and disrupt the learning of others. We have noticed that a large number of students are arriving right at the bell or after 8:30. Being punctual is an important life skill. We ask all RHS families to make a commitment to arriving to school on time. Please review your family's morning routine and make adjustments accounting for weather and traffic.

## Student Accounts – MS Teams, MyEducation BC, MyWeeklyPlanner

All Richmond Secondary students have been issued credentials to access SD38 district accounts for **MS Teams**, **MyEducation BC**, and **MyWeeklyPlanner**. Students can access computer labs, the Scholantis Portal, Office 365, Microsoft Teams, and more. It is very important that all RHS students have access to these digital platforms and tools. Students should see an administrator in the office if they can't access any of these tools.

- **MS Teams** is the communication and collaboration platform that many RHS teachers will use for class communication, sharing class materials and resources, video conferencing, collaborative work, and file storage. Students will have access to the Office Apps (Word, Excel, PowerPoint, OneNote, etc.) while at school and at home, and will be provided with secure personal file storage within OneDrive.
- **MyEducation BC** is the platform students and parents use to access schedules, attendance, report cards, transcript information, and much more. Students and parents each have an account with their own login credentials.
- **MyWeeklyPlanner** is the platform students will use to sign up for Personal Learning Time (PLT) each week.

## Personal Learning Time (PLT)

In the first few weeks, we have gradually implemented Personal Learning Time (PLT) where students have been using this self-directed time for their learning with teacher support. Students can use the time to complete assignments, prepare for upcoming assessments, get academic support, organize their learning, work on projects, pursue areas of personal interest, and more. Each week students sign up for a teacher-supported learning space on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 8:30-9:30 AM. Students are encouraged to organize their learning plan (take an inventory of what needs to be done), prioritize tasks, make a plan, and sign up online at [rhs.myweeklyplanner.net](https://rhs.myweeklyplanner.net). We recommend that students sign up no later than the Monday before PLT days.



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
## Parents and Caregivers at Meet the Teachers

## RHS Terry Fox Run on September 28

Richmond Secondary will once again honour a great Canadian hero by participating in the **Terry Fox Run** on **Thursday, September 28**. Terry Fox was an 18-year old student at SFU when he lost his leg to cancer. He decided to raise awareness and funds by running across Canada, the equivalent of a full marathon a day, on one leg. His **Marathon of Hope** covered over 3000 miles when he had to stop as the cancer returned. Terry Fox passed away at the age of 22, yet his remarkable story continues to inspire Canada and the world. All students and staff will travel to Minoru Park and run or walk together on September 28. Students from our PE Leadership class will be collecting money and students are asked to bring a toonie, if they are able. ## National Day for Truth and Reconciliation – September 30



As a school and district, we are dedicated to fostering an inclusive and compassionate environment for all our students, families, and staff. As we approach September 30, the **National Day for Truth and Reconciliation**, we wanted to share with you a few important events that are taking place in our school and district:

On September 22, our entire district staff engaged in a day of learning about Indigenous History, First Peoples Principles of Learning, and our collective role in reconciliation.

Additionally, in honour of the children lost and the generations impacted by residential schools, we will be displaying the orange "Every Child Matters" flag in our school. The flag serves as a collective dedication to learning, understanding, healing and reconciliation.

Finally, a reminder that the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation occurs on Saturday this year, so the statutory day falls on Monday, October 2 and school will not be in session. This day provides an opportunity for all Canadians to recognize and commemorate the legacy of residential schools. On September 30, we encourage all members of our community to find meaningful ways to recognize and raise awareness about the history and legacies of the residential school system in Canada. In addition, RHS will join all other Richmond schools in observing **Orange Shirt Day** on Friday, September 29.

Have you ever wondered how technology products are built, what skills and abilities are required, and what the various career options are available in technology?



## September is Literacy Month and the RHS Library Learning Commons (LLC) is Open!



Students who read regularly are often curious learners who do well in school. At RHS, our Library Learning Commons (LLC) is open from 8:00 AM to 3:30 PM. The LLC is a welcoming place for all students to do research, to complete projects and assignments, to read for pleasure, or to just hang out and relax. We have comfortable seating and study areas, and five collaborative tables with laptops and flat screen TVs to allow students to work in groups. We also have a 3-D printer and we add hundreds of new books every year. Our LLC staff includes Ms. Betty Chung and Mr. Travis Truong and they are always available to help students do research or to find something interesting to read. 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## Academic Excellence at Richmond Secondary School

The Ministry of Education reported that 231 or 84% of our 2023 graduating students achieved "Honours" status for obtaining a "higher than 3.0 (a better than B average) in the best 76 credits for required courses and elective credits". The percentage of RHS students who achieve "Honours" status in the 3-year graduation program far exceeds the provincial average.

Richmond Secondary is the only school in the District certified to offer the *International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme*. This challenging two-year program is recognized by universities all over the world for producing very thoughtful, knowledgeable, capable and well-rounded learners. IB students are externally evaluated using a 7-point scale in the six required subject areas and can earn 3 additional points for the 'core areas' of Theory of Knowledge and the Extended Essay, for a maximum of 45 points. Students need a minimum of 24 points and meet additional requirements to achieve an IB Diploma. An IB Diploma score of 40 or more points is outstanding and indicates that students have achieved exceptionally well on a world-wide scale. Congratulations to 51 RSS students who achieved an IB Diploma in 2023 and to the following students for achieving an exceptional score of >40: Tiffany Ho, Jerry Huang, Max Long, Harry Peng, Melody Wang, Kelly Wei Jin, Jack Wu, and Alaina Zhang.

RHS students are encouraged to show their school spirit and pride and can do so by purchasing a piece of Colt clothing. The **Colt Zone**, located beside room 207, is fully stocked with value-priced RHS branded clothing and merchandise and is open at lunch.

### Richmond Secondary School's Teaching Kitchen

At RHS, we are very fortunate to have a full-service cafeteria located in the school. The cafeteria is now open and available to students at break and lunch. Students from the district's Youth Train in Trades Professional Cook program along with RHS culinary students, under the direction and supervision of our culinary staff are preparing flavourful and nutritious meals and treats for students and staff to purchase at very reasonable and affordable prices. Each week the teaching kitchen publishes a menu full of diverse and delicious food options. #### Drivers

- Stick to the Speed Limit
- Scan Crosswalks and Intersections from Left to Right as You Approach
- Leave Your Phone Alone
- Notice if Other Drivers are Slowing Down or Stopping
- Give Yourself Enough Stopping Distance
- Watch for School Buses

#### Pedestrians

- Cross Only at Marked or Controlled Crosswalks
- Look Both Ways Before Crossing the Street
- Make Eye Contact with Drivers Approaching the Crosswalk
- Double-Check Lights and Signals are Working at Controlled Crosswalks

#### Parents

- Let Your Child Enter and Exit Your Car on the Side Closest to the Sidewalk
- Before Starting Your Car, Check for Small Children Hidden From Your View

The use of technology continues to grow in importance for enriching and enhancing students' learning. As a school community, we must all work together to ensure our students' use of technology is safe, thoughtful, respectful, accountable, and demonstrates good digital citizenship.

## BE SAFE

### Access to information

- Any information you put on the internet will always be there for people to see...forever.
- Everything you do online, in a browser, or using an app, can often be seen by people you do not know.
- Be thoughtful and cautious about what you post online.
  - If you have to question whether or not a comment or photo is appropriate to post, then don't post it.

### Personal Information

- Personal and private information about yourself should not be shared online.
  - Don't give out personal information like your birthdate, full name, where you live, phone number, or what school you attend.
  - Your passwords should not be shared with anyone other than your parent/guardian.

### Social Media

- Always set your controls for maximum privacy.
- Only accept friend requests from people you know, making sure you can confirm their identity.
- Tell your parent or a trusted adult if anything online makes you feel uncomfortable.
- Never meet someone in person who you met online without your parent/guardian permission.

## BE THOUGHTFUL

### What I post

Think about whether you would want your parents, teachers, college, or future employers to see what you post, like, rate, or comment on.

### Keep your information safe

Think about and understand any information you are asked to fill out online or through an app. Provide as little information as possible to protect your personal identity. If you are not sure, ask your parent or a teacher.

### Not everything is true

Don't believe that everything you read on the internet is true. Check it out first and explore multiple sources.

# Responsible Technology Use

## BE RESPECTFUL

### Everyone is valuable

What you say or write should never cause someone to feel upset or that they are threatened. You should tell your parent/guardian or a trusted adult about anything that you experience online that you think might be unsafe or makes you feel uncomfortable. Don't become a victim of bullying, harassment or exploitation.

### Respect other's work and property

Do not access, copy, remove or alter any other person's files or information without their knowledge and permission. Sharing answers for other students to copy will come back to harm you in the end.

### Treat the technology with care

### Respect other students personal property

The internet is shared with lots of people. Streaming online videos, listening to music, downloading or uploading large files and playing online games slows down the school's network. Share the internet bandwidth (highway) with others.

### Keep a balanced life

Remember there are other interesting things to do offline. Keep a healthy balance by limiting screen time and participating in other activities



## BE ACCOUNTABLE

When using personal devices at school, follow the expectations set out in the "Use of Personal Information / Responsible Technology Use" policy as well as the expectations set out by your teacher.

### There are consequences

Understand everything you do can have positive or negative consequences. You will be responsible for any actions you take that are against school or district expectations or that break the law.

### There is a time for everything

Remember to not let the use of technology for fun or social purposes get in the way of your learning, focus, work or other priorities at school or home.

- Collect and reuse water for outdoor plant use


